

Safe driving

Safe driving is essential to protect yourself and others: it requires respect for the rules, constant attention, and prudent behavior, approaching every journey with awareness and responsibility.

Make sure the vehicle is in optimal condition before starting the journey and that required maintenance has been carried out.

E.g.: check the vehicle before departure (brakes, tires, lights, seat belts, oil and water levels).

Comply with traffic regulations and ensure you hold a valid license suitable for the vehicle you are driving.

E.g.: fasten your seat belt, respect speed limits, road signs, and right-of-way rules.

It is compulsory to have specialist training in order to carry out electrical work.

E.g.: ensure you hold up-to-date PES, PAV and PEI training certificates (renewed every 5 years) and that you have been formally authorised and appointed by your employer, specifying the type of electrical work involved.

Attend driving courses when promoted by your company.

E.g.: if you are a Mobile Worker, attend the Safe Driving course.

Before getting behind the wheel, make sure you are fit to drive.

E.g.: do not drive if you are tired, feeling unwell, lacking concentration, or in an impaired state.

Ensure that equipment is loaded safely onto the vehicle.

E.g.: loads must be properly secured and must not compromise stability or visibility while driving.

The use of devices while driving and the consumption of drugs and alcohol are prohibited.

E.g.: if you need to make calls, use Bluetooth or hands-free systems or stop the vehicle. Do not drive if you are taking medication that may affect attention and reflexes. Do not consume alcohol during breaks.

Always drive cautiously. Take regular breaks.

E.g.: adjust speed and driving style to traffic and road conditions, do not perform risky maneuvers or aggressive behavior. Take breaks during long journeys.

Before departure, evaluate the best route and the type of vehicle to use.

E.g.: choose the vehicle based on the site you need to reach. Do not use a small car on mountain roads.

Ensure that others are aware of your movements so they can be promptly informed if necessary.

E.g.: always inform your manager and/or the colleague at the site you will be reaching.



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
